Student Online Art Show Offers Attendees a Safe and Virtual Gallery Experience

Henry Ford Academy: Alameda School for Art + Design presents a fun at-home, interactive event

SAN ANTONIO, MAY 21st: While educators, students and families adapt to find “normalcy” amidst the COVID-19 quarantine, Henry Ford Academy: Alameda School for Art + Design demonstrates a hope that still burns bright during these uncertain times. Keeping creativity and innovation alive, the college preparatory high school is hosting an online art show, “Uncommon Art, Uncommon Times,” on May 28th.

When an off-campus learning plan is not in effect, HFA’s approximately 120 students attend school on UTSA’s Downtown Campus, where they have the unique opportunity to gain an understanding of what is needed to be successful in college. Whether they are on campus or engaged in their off-campus Alternate Learning Plan, HFA is dedicated to an *Empowering Education* that focuses on students’ wellbeing first, embraces art + design as key elements of a community-connected education, and offers engaging learning approaches that support academic and personal success. While the 2020 pandemic has not been the easiest for these young artists, they have been preparing for this virtual exhibit for weeks, and their voices and perspectives on their current experience are reflected in their art.

Featuring multiple mediums like ceramics, painting, digital graphic design, video, sketch and more, attendees can expect to be both community-proud and intrigued when perusing the walls of art in the online gallery. HFA’s Art Director, *John Medina*, will kick off the show with a brief introduction and then reveal the URL link to the online art show. Medina is an award-winning artist and has been recognized for collaborating with *San Anto Cultural Arts* to create the world’s first stereoscopic 3-D mural entitled, *Vision del Futuro*. “It’s been an interesting journey this year, but I’m proud that we have this opportunity to highlight our students’ talents and how far they’ve come – despite the circumstances. Not only are they resilient, but I’m certain they will impress all who attend the showcase.”
